Extra response time

Visual prompts and cues

Pre teaching of subject specific vocabulary

Adjustment of adult language

Chunking instructions, give instructions one at a time, ask X to repeat back instructions

Give extra time for xx to respond during speaking and listening activities

Support the narrative element of written expression; for example, via use of a story board or use of approaches from self regulated strategy development (SRSD: see www.thinksrsd.com)
